Prologue Via the Web

As I hope most of you know by now, we have a marvelous new web site, thanks to the heroic efforts of a few. You can see it at <http://bostonprimetimers.org>. You can view current and past issues of the Prologue there, along with a lot of other content. Some of the site's content is accessible only with a password. If you did not receive the current password via email, we don't have your correct email address.

You can help our Boston Prime Timers club reduce expenses and hold the line on dues if you are willing to receive your Prologue exclusively via the web site. You will be able to read it sooner, since it becomes available as soon as it's finalized, and before the copies are printed for mailing. Other advantages are that the Prologue on the web is in color, any links in the text can be clicked without retyping, and you're saving trees.

In fact our biggest on-going expense, over \$400 per month, goes towards printing and mailing members their Prologue. We take in about \$7,500 per year from members' dues, and we pay out over \$4,800 per year for the Prologue. Our other big and constant expense is the office rent, at \$3,000 per year. We have other sources of income and other expenses, but those are the big ones. You can see that reducing our expenses on the Prologue can have a big impact on keeping our finances stable.

If you are willing to change to receiving the Prologue exclusively via the web site, please check the box on the last sheet at the end, and give us your current email address for verification. You may also call this information into the office if you wish. If you try the web and find it doesn't work well for you, you can always change back to paper. **Thanks for your help!** Steve Vorenberg, Treasurer

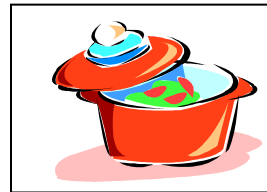

Among the important issues that have been addressed by the BPT Board recently is the adoption of a Mission Statement. Boston Gay Pride June 12

"Riots to Rights - Celebrating 40 Years of Progress" honors the 1969 Stonewall Riots that commenced the modern Gay Rights movement and commemorates the progress we've made as a community's since those early days of the battle for equal rights. As Boston Pride celebrates its 40th Anniversary, we encourage our community to remember the brave pioneers before us who bravely took to the streets in protest and in anger, but with incredible hope that one day we would overcome the harsh shackles and restraints of hatred, bigotry and discrimination.

Saturday 6-12-2010 is the most prominent day of Boston Pride Week. At noon, the Boston Gay Pride Parade commences at noon, departing from around the intersection of Tremont and Clarendon streets, in the

city's most gay-identified neighborhood, the historic South End. The parade winds northeast, then north on Berkeley Street into the Back Bay, where it turns east onto Boylston Street and passes by the famed Boston Public Garden and the posh (and very gay-friendly) Four Seasons Boston. It then turns left onto Charles Street, heading north alongside the scenic Boston Common, before turning east on Beacon Street and passing before the Massachusetts State House, then winding around Tremont Street and Cambridge Street to end at Boston City Hall Plaza. This is one of the more popular and scenic gay pride marches in the country, drawing enormous crowds and passing before some of the city's most prominent buildings.
